

## Me para huarahi hou e kimihi ana mō te whakarauora i te reo Māori – “He tūmatakahuki, he reo tukutuku”

E whakahaumanutia ai te reo Māori hei reo ūkaipō i ngā kāinga me ngā hapori o te motu, e kimi ana a Te Mātāwai me Te Pae Motuhake mō Te Reo Tukutuku i ētahi hōtaka me ētahi kaupapa e whai ana ki te tūhonohono, ki te para huarahi hou e waihangatia ai he papa hou ki runga i tētahi tūāpapa e kitea ana tōna angitūtanga.

Hei tā Scotty Morrison, Toihau o te Pae Motuhake o Te Reo Tukutuku “kua oke auroa ā tātou rāngai ki te whakarauora i te reo Māori, e ai rā ki ngā pūkenga e kimihi ana i tēnā, i tēnā rāngai, heoi anō, e whakapono ana mātou kua eke ki te wā e whakakotahi ai ngā rāngai i runga i te whakaaro kotahi, i te whāinga kotahi e tūturu ai ngā panonitanga mō tō tātou reo.”

Hei tāna anō, “I runga i tēnei kōrero, e harikoa ana te ngākau ki te pānui ake ka tuwhera te rauna haumitanga a Te Reo Tukutuku, nā te mea e mōhio ana au ka tāpaea mai ngā momo kaupapa, ngā momo hōtaka e eke ai ngā hua o ngā mahi whakarauora i te reo Māori ki tērā kua roa e matenuitia ana e te iwi.”

E whā ngā rōpū matua o Te Reo Tukutuku nō ngā rāngai reo Māori e whā o te hapori, te ao pāpāho, te ao mātauranga me te hunga Māori noho taone.

Hei tā te Hoa-Toihau o Te Mātāwai, a Waihoroi Shortland, “he wā whakaiiihi tēnei mō Te Mātāwai me te reo Māori, nā te mea kua whakakotahi ētahi o ō tātou toa o ngā rāngai ki te whakatakoto, ki te whakatinana i tētahi mahere haumitanga kairangatira whai whakakitenga, “He tūmatakahuki, he reo tukutuku” – e pawero tahi ana i ngā kautuku whakarauora i te reo (i tēnei wā, haere ake nei) e tautokona ai ngā huarahi katoa ki te reo.”
